Minister's Letter

Dear Friends

When people initially think about Christmas, minds turn to nativity plays, twinkling lights, jollity, children's eager and expectant faces, not to mention the "canned music" in supermarkets, which subliminally urges people on to "buy, buy, buy" and celebrate the season with unaffordable extravagance. Christmas has been sanitised, and commercialised and "Santa," sometimes conspiring with elves and a reindeer or two, has hijacked the season to such an extent that the Christ child has been pushed out of the manger, often right out of sight, and with the emphasis upon merriment, we lose the real meaning of Christmas, as well as alienating those who are struggling for many different reasons.

The truth is that the first Christmas was much more akin to the difficult life circumstances we experience as part of the human condition and was a world away from the un-abandoned mirth that calls out to us today.

When we look more deeply into the account of the birth of Christ, we find it is rooted in something very much at odds with our society's understanding of Christmas today. We have the humble obedience and in a sense the sacrifice of Mary, which put her at risk of alienation, persecution, and huge life changing experiences. Then there is the quiet faithfulness of Joseph, who discerned through a God-given dream not to break off their betrothal but to care for Mary and Jesus.

The Christmas story then takes to the road; a long, arduous and fearful 90-mile journey to Bethlehem on foot (at best on a donkey!) If the journey had been undertaken during the Judean winter, the weather would have been hot during the day and freezing at night. Undoubtedly the heavily pregnant Mary, with Joseph, her supportive espoused, would probably have doubted themselves and questioned why on earth they were on such a tedious and difficult journey at such a critical time.

Sadly, at journey's end, the hardship was far from over, because we are told in the Gospels, that the town was overcrowded and there was nowhere for them to stay; can you imagine the desperation and despair, at being turned away in such a fragile state? Some scholars think it plausible that the place where Mary gave birth, was not a stable, but a cave. Whilst such a place may have provided some protection from the elements, the harsh conditions under which Jesus was born, would have made the event far from the cosy, warm and comfortable stable depicted on our Christmas cards. Christ coming into the midst of humanity, is as real, and as gritty as it comes.

There was neither comfort nor perfection; it was an unstable world, which was chaotic and harsh and confusing. Christ was born into an occupied land from which the family went into exile, becoming refugees in Egypt, due to the jealousy and wrath of king Herod, and hot on their heels was the massacre of the holy innocents at the behest of Herod, something which rarely gets a mention.

As we reclaim the reality of the first Christmas, and put the manger back in its place, we are reminded that God comes to us, expressed in a "language" and "clothed" in a form that we can understand and relate to; not as a mighty and powerful king, but in vulnerability, in the midst of struggles and pain, in the midst of doubts and fears, into a situation of displacement and alienation.

During Advent and Christmas, we often hear the words "And the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us." The word "dwelt" in Greek means "tent." In our over familiarity with the "cosy" account of Christ's birth, we can so easily forget too, just how extraordinary it is that God moved into OUR neighbourhood, as the Message translation puts it, taking upon himself this fragile tent of humanity, experiencing all the pain and suffering of the human condition.

As we peer into the humble manger at Christmas, what we come face to face with is a tiny newborn baby, a symbol of new life and hope, the Christ child, our God who enters into our darkest and most fragile places. He comes to us in an act of solidarity, offering struggling hearts the assurance that he is indeed Emmanuel, God with us, but also pointing forwards to the new life he brings through his resurrection, and to the time when he will come again in glory, when there will be no darkness, no heartache, no empty chairs, no lingering sadness, no regrets, no pain, no tears, only unbroken and immeasurable joy.

How ever you approach Christmas this year, may you all find, know and dwell within the peace, light and hope of the Christ Child.

Our Zambia link:

The rainy season has begun in Zambia, where prayers are constantly for sufficient rain these next months to fill the rivers and dams and to water the newly planted crops.

During December, the UCZ will, like us, be observing Advent and celebrating Christmas. Pray especially for the choirs, drama groups and preachers as they present the Gospel of Jesus' coming and birth among us.

December 21st is Health Sunday in UCZ churches, praying especially for the work of the church in its two rural hospitals and its nine clinics.

During the rainy season malaria is particularly prevalent; the wet weather is the time for mosquitos to breed. The work of the hospitals and clinics is vital while Zambia is still suffering the after effects of Covid and cholera epidemics.

Pray especially during the weeks of December for young people receiving the results of their school leaving examinations and decisions about their future.

A Zambian Christian who was asked "Are you ready for Christmas?" replied: "You mean, am I ready for Jesus to be born again in my life, my home and my church? Well, I am trying to make room for Jesus in my heart." That is a word to us that being ready for Christmas is not only about the presents, the food and the travel arrangements; it is about being ready for Jesus.

In the UCZ, worship to see the New Year in is very important. The theme of New Year worship this time is to be "The narrative must change" – the story we tell about ourselves as a church and as a nation needs to be about our unity and what we have in common rather than our arguments and rivalries. This is especially important because 2026 is an election year in Zambia, and the repression and violence around neighbouring Tanzania's recent election has raised anxiety in Zambia.

Pray for Zambia, especially the people of St Andrew's, Lusaka, as they pray for us.

Sonia Dahmani

'You condemn me for sullying Tunisia, when it's you who sully it with your unfair trials."

Lawyer unjustly detained for peacefully expressing her views

Sonia Dahmani, a lawyer and media personality, has been arbitrarily detained since May 2024 for peacefully exercising her right to freedom of expression. She faces five prosecutions and is enduring cruel, inhumane detention conditions that seriously threaten her health.

Sonia has long spoken out on racism, migration, and prison conditions in Tunisia. Since late 2023, she has faced mounting legal harassment for her public comments. Authorities have charged her under a repressive cybercrime law for 'spreading false news'.

Her arrest follows President Kais Saied's authoritarian power grab and growing repression of civil society. Sonia is one of dozens of people targeted for criticising the government, and her case reflects the sharp decline of free expression and judicial independence in Tunisia.
